History shows that civilization has developed through a gradual expansion of the scale of human cooperation.

4. City
5. State
6. Nation
7. International alliances

Each new stage did not abolish the previous one. Instead, it brought people together into broader communities capable of addressing challenges on a larger scale.

Today, for the first time, humanity faces challenges that are planetary in scope:

9. Artificial intelligence development
10. Biotechnology
11. Nuclear security
12. Space exploration
13. Global migration
14. Information interdependence

No single country can determine the future of civilization on its own.

Humanity is therefore gradually becoming a unified subject of its own history.

Unity Does Not Mean Uniformity

One of the main obstacles to cooperation is the assumption that unity requires abandoning differences.

The future requires their integration.

Science enables humanity to understand how the world works.

Technology enables us to transform it.

Developed consciousness helps us determine what those transformations should ultimately serve.

Artificial Intelligence Opens a New Historical Possibility

For the first time, humanity is gaining a tool capable of integrating virtually the entire accumulated body of human knowledge.

This creates the possibility of moving:

from competition between knowledge systems to cooperation among them;

from fragmented solutions to systemic understanding;

from managing consequences to consciously shaping the future.

But this opportunity can only be realized if humanity develops a shared direction.

Without a common purpose, even the most advanced technologies may amplify existing contradictions.

None of these dimensions can secure a sustainable future on its own.

Only their coordinated development can create a new type of civilization.

This is why we call the proposed model **integral**.
